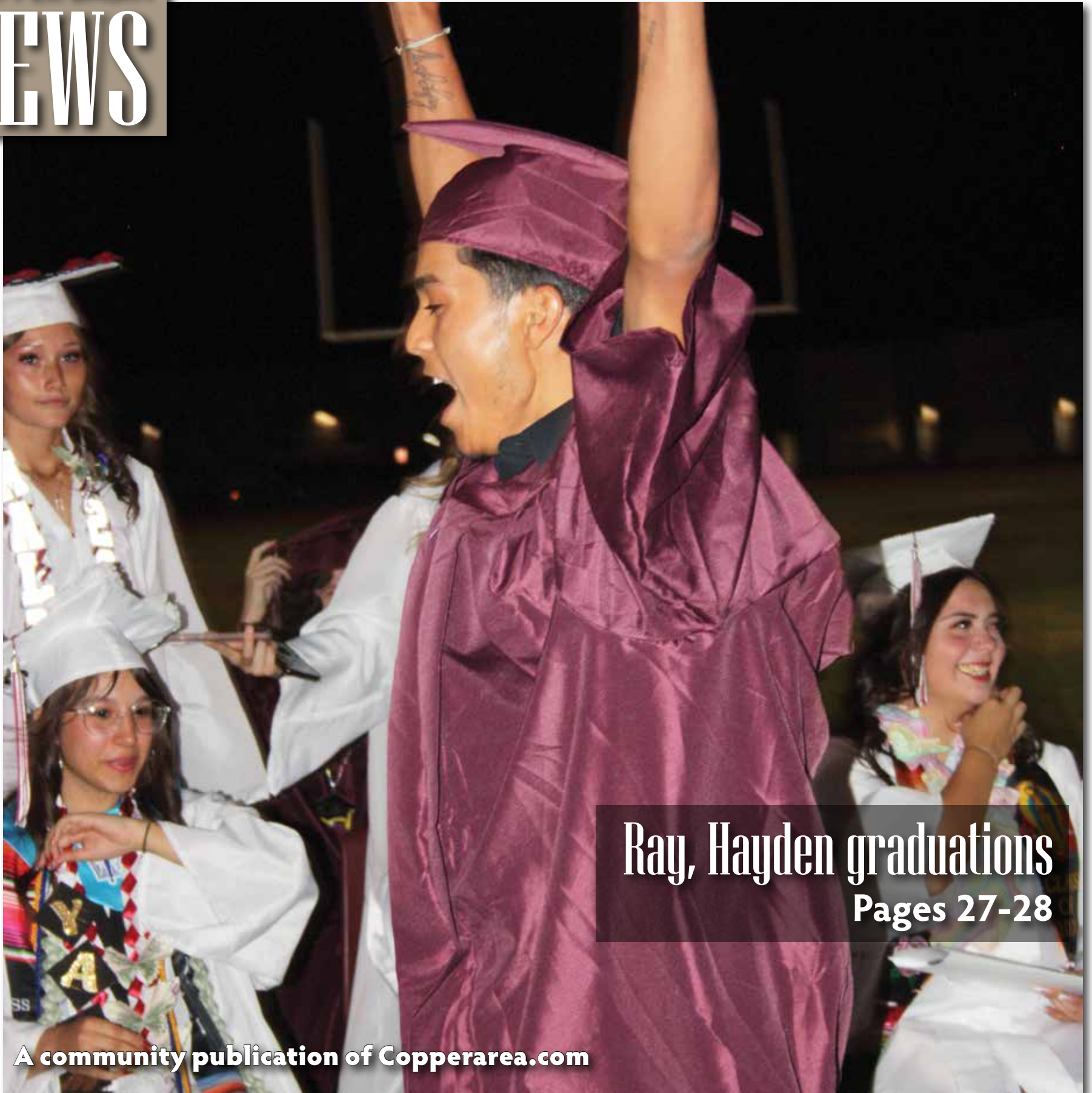

It is with great sorrow that we announce the passing of Fred Sanchez, a long-time resident of Mammoth, Arizona. He passed away peacefully on May 10, 2024, at the age of 97. He was born to Federico and Raymunda Sanchez on May 1, 1927, one of 18 children.

The love of his life survives him, his wife of 77 years, Nora, and their 6 children, Daniel (Martha) Sanchez, Michael Sanchez, Rick (Janie)

# Hayden Police arrest man for aggravated assault

On Monday, May 20, 2024, at about 11 a.m., Hayden Police were dispatched to an address in the area of Thorne and Fourth St., Winkelman, for a suspected domestic violence incident.

The officers received additional information while enroute to the address that the suspect, later identified as Michael Berry III, was armed with a light blue handgun. Upon the officers' arrival, Berry was contacted outside the residence and was taken into custody at gunpoint

with assistance from the Kearny Police Department.

According to Hayden Police, Berry had taken a bus from Phoenix to Globe and was able to get a ride to Winkelman where his girlfriend resides. Berry entered the residence without permission and engaged in a verbal argument. He then drew a weapon out of his fanny pack and pointed it at his girlfriend and her grandmother. The gun matching their description was later located by police.

Berry was arrested, transported and booked into the Gila County Jail in Globe. He was charged with two counts of aggravated assault, two counts of disorderly conduct, one count of misconduct involving a weapon and one count of burglary. He is also facing a criminal damage charge for damages to a Kearny Police patrol vehicle.

Chief Brian Marquez would like to thank the Kearny Police Department for their quick response and in taking Berry into custody without incident.

## CAC Medical Assistant Program partners with Sun Life Health Clinics

PINAL COUNTY, Ariz. – Supported through the Workforce Innovation and Opportunity Act (WIOA) Grant Program, Sun Life Health is partnering with Central Arizona College's Medical Assistant program to help address the shortage of medical assistants across the state of Arizona.

Reports indicate that from 2022 to 2032, it is projected that employment of medical assistants will increase 14

percent, which is faster than the average for all occupations. According to the US Bureau of Labor Statistics, "About 114,600 openings for medical assistants are projected each year, on average, over the decade. Many of those openings are expected to result from the need to replace workers who transfer to different occupations or exit the labor force due to retirement. The large baby-boom population continues to enter older

age groups, which typically have more healthcare concerns than younger age groups and will continue to increase demand for medical services" (<https://www.bls.gov/ooh/healthcare/medical-assistants.htm>).

Lisa Mahone, Program Director and

Professor of the Medical Assistant program explained, "Participants will receive funding for tuition, course materials, CPR/First Aid certification, and registration cost for their credentialing exam along with intensive wrap-around

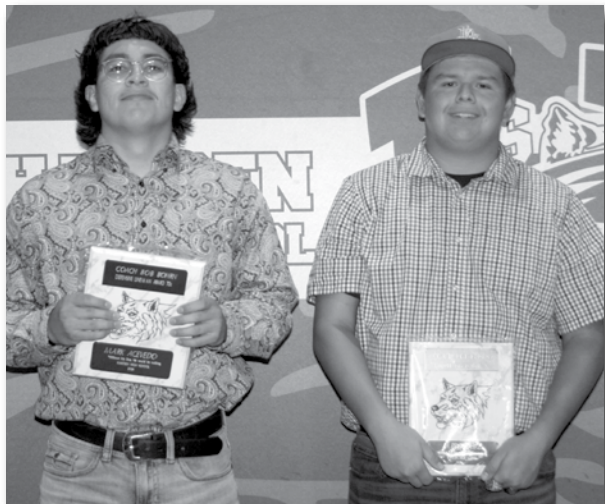

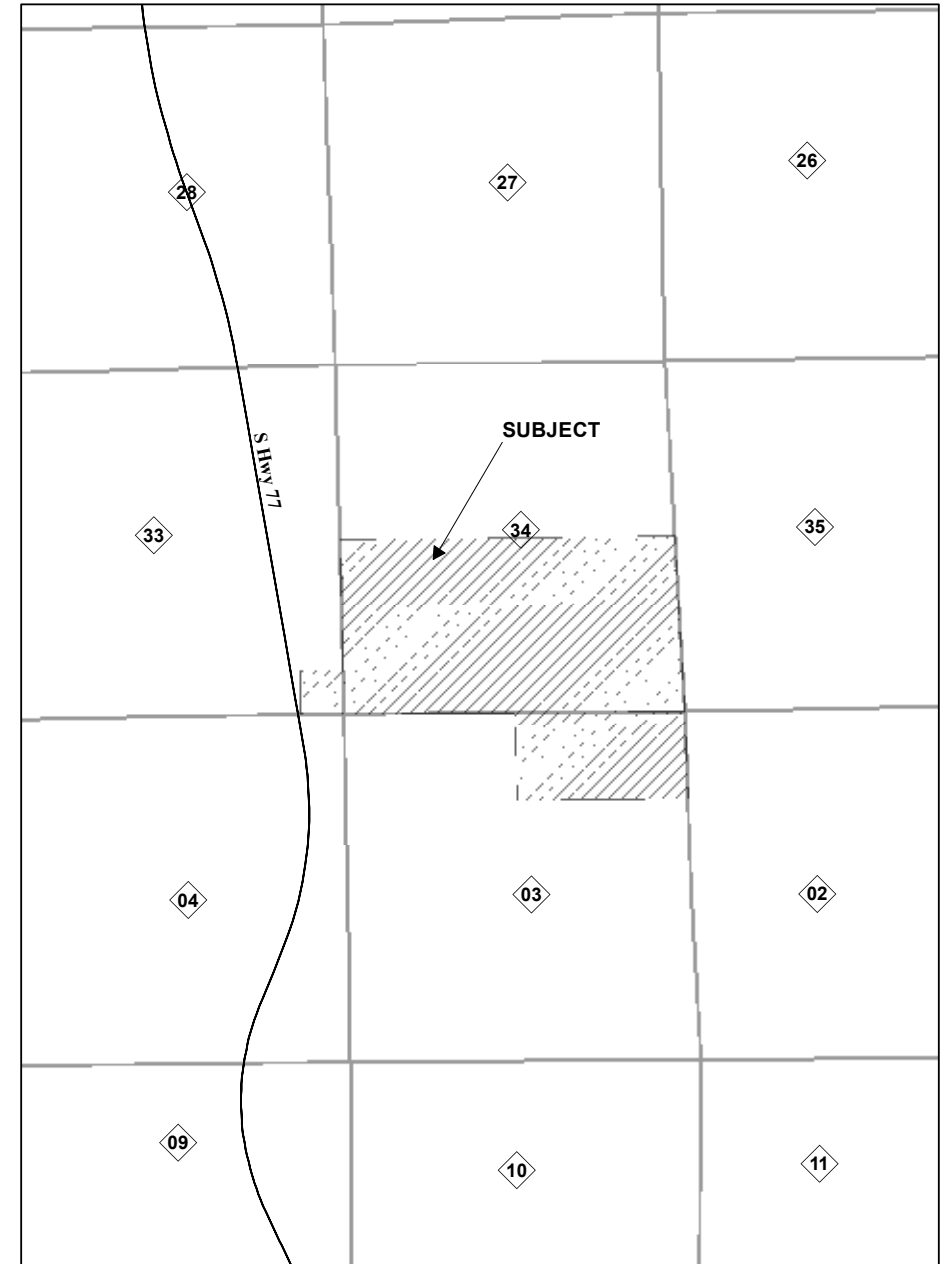

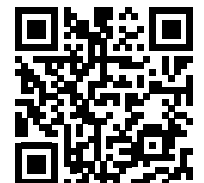
